Helen Jewett was discovered murdered in her bed on April 10, 1836. Three bloody gashes covered her face, and her body had been set on fire by her assailant. When the flames were extinguished, constables discovered a man's handkerchief near the bed. Later, a hatchet was found in the back yard.

Trial: June 2, 1836 The eighteen thirties marked the beginning of the "penny press" and the Helen Jewett murder was made to order for sensational journalism. Competing New York newspapers were in a frenzy to print all the information they could find on Helen Jewett and Richard Robinson and the public could not get enough.

Murder by Gaslight: Helen Jewett - The Girl in Green

Six days after he was cleared of the 1836 murder of prostitute Helen/Ellen Jewett, the New York Herald reported that Robinson would change his name and leave for the West or Texas. Richard Parmelee appeared in Texas before other Parmelee families. In 1836, he was a witness to the signing of a Nacogdoches County deed.
