Watson was called the "first systematizer of the theology of Methodism," and his Institutes quickly became the standard exposition of Methodist doctrine. Robert Chiles in his *Theological Transition in American Methodism: 1790-1935*, categorizes Watson as "easily the single most determinative of the early Methodist theologians."

ENTIRE SANCTIFICATION IN EARLY AMERICAN METHODISM

As Methodism in America was growing rapidly throughout the nineteenth century, more attention was given to problems of church growth and an expanding American frontier. Precision in theological formulation and doctrine was not a major focus during that period of activism and growth.

While a commitment to entire sanctification had been a core unifying doctrine within the broad American Methodist family up until the 1850s, the expulsion of Benjamin Titus (B.T.) Roberts from the Methodist Episcopal Church (MEC) and the subsequent formation of the Free Methodist Church (FMC) represent an initial fragmentation of what had been a coherent theological tradition.

Theologically Methodism has followed the dominant schools-liberalism earlier in the century and to a lesser extent Neoorthodoxy later. In response to these theological and ecumenical currents the Evangelical Methodist Church was founded in 1948 and the Evangelical Church of North America after the 1968 merger.

Methodism at the turn of the 20th century placed little emphasis on the importance of theological inquiry. But it was not always so. S. Paul Schilling wrote that in the opinion of many, Methodists have only a marginal interest in doctrine and theology. ¹ Many even claim that Methodism is non-theological, insisting that the main emphases have always been practical and evangelical.

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
